

DR. LIZ GULLIFORD

Dr. Liz Gulliford is Associate Professor in the School of Education at the University of Birmingham. Liz works for the *Jubilee Centre for Character and Virtues* and currently teaches on the University of Birmingham's MA in Character Education. She is also an Associate Fellow of the Oxford Character Project.

Liz has an interdisciplinary background with an MA in
Theology (Trinity College Oxford), MPhil in Theology and Religious
Studies (Queens' College, Cambridge), and a BPS-accredited BSc
in Psychology from Anglia Ruskin University. Her PhD (Queens' College,
Cambridge, 2011) established a firm, critical foundation for theoretical and practical work in positive
psychology, positive education, and character education, upon which she has progressively built an
international reputation.

During her tenure as an Associate Professor in Positive Psychology at the University of Northampton (2018 – 2023), Liz was Co-Pi on a John Templeton Foundation funded research project on 'The role of exemplar narratives in cultivating character' (2019 – 2023), which was part of a larger network grant on moral exemplars.

Liz has carried out extensive conceptual and empirical work on gratitude, forgiveness, hope, optimism, courage, compassion, virtue ethics, moral development, positive psychology, positive education, character education and exemplarism. She has published in a wide range of journals in psychology, education, and philosophy. She has also given numerous invited presentations internationally to both academic and lay audiences.

Leading for Impact: The Five Leadership Practices That Drive Character Education

This session will explore the leadership practices of high school principals who foster cultures of character within their schools. Participants will gain insights into Kouzes and Posner's Five Practices of Exemplary Leadership and how these align with character education. Additionally, they will learn specific strategies principals use to model the way, inspire a shared vision, challenge the process, enable others to act, and encourage the heart, as well as understand the role of leadership development programs like the Hope Leadership Academy in shaping character-driven leaders.

Character Caught - Lessons from a Summer Institute Fostering Character Education in K-12 Schools

This roundtable discussion will highlight lessons learned from a two-day summer institute at Arkansas State University, where school leaders, including administrators and teacher leaders, gathered to explore the integration of character education in K-12 schools. Seventy-six participants from 18 campuses across 6 districts engaged with guest speakers to gain insights on how to incorporate effective character education programs into their school cultures. The session will share key takeaways from the university planning team and provide a preview of plans for the 2025 Summer Institute on Character.

Aquamarine #2

Infusing Character Education in New Program Development

This session will explore how Samford University's Kinesiology department is intentionally integrating Christ-like character development into its new Master's in Sport Science program, in collaboration with the Office of Faith, Learning, and Vocation. Attendees will learn about the significance of embedding character development in higher education, with a focus on the program's alignment to the university's mission, the School of Health Professions, and national standards from the National Strength and Conditioning Association. Additionally, the session will present a draft of a character development workbook designed for both faculty and students, which will be used during the internship course to reinforce character integration throughout the program.

How Do You Grow? Incorporating Virtue Development into Preparatory Programs

This session explores the importance of character development in preparing educational leaders and introduces the virtue reflection log as a tool for personal growth. Participants will learn how students can target specific virtues for development, reflecting on opportunities to "catch" and "seek" growth throughout the week. The session will also discuss how this reflective practice can be applied in classrooms to connect character development with academic content and professional practice.

Effective Strategies and Best Practices for Infusing Character Education into the College Curriculum

This workshop highlights Project Grow, a character education initiative at the University of West Alabama supported by the Kern Family Foundation, which integrates virtues like integrity, empathy, and responsibility into educator preparation programs. Presenters will share effective strategies for revising curriculum to infuse character education, using the Student Affairs in Higher Education (SAHE) program as a detailed exemplar. Participants will engage with practical tools, including a curriculum revision template and guiding questions, to begin shaping character-infused learning objectives for their own programs.

Character Taught through Socratic Seminar

This workshop explores character development through a Socratic Seminar featuring an ethical dilemma from Novastone Learning. The film Social Dilemma affirms that social media is a challenging topic for school leaders with the rise of cyberbullying and inappropriate content sharing. What happens, though, when inappropriate content sharing is by an anonymous user after school hours? Is there any recourse for that, and what happens when the anonymous Twitter poster is revealed and turns out not to be who you expected in the school? This workshop's objectives will ask two questions of the participants: how do the elements of character surface in educational ethical dilemmas and how can socratic seminar be used to teach character?

Story Matters: A Reminder How Narrative Fosters Virtue

This presentation offers a compelling reminder of the vital role good stories play in character formation, especially for educators, parents, and homeschoolers. While virtue cannot be directly taught through instruction alone, stories have the power to shape imagination and inspire a genuine desire for what is good, beautiful, and human. By exploring how narrative influences our inner lives, the session emphasizes the importance of placing rich, meaningful stories before our students and ourselves as a cornerstone of character education.

Virtuous Leadership and Emotionally Healthy Schools

This session explores the critical role of school leaders in modeling virtuous character traits to support the emotional well-being of their school communities, particularly in the wake of the Covid-19 pandemic. Emphasizing the concept of character being "caught," the presentation highlights how leadership impacts staff and faculty wellness, an area often overlooked compared to student support. Attendees will gain insights into the evolving demands of 21st-century school leadership, the complexities of the leadership construct, and strategies for fostering emotionally healthy, character-rich school environments.

Aquamarine #2

Fostering intrinsic motivation to help create a culture of character

This roundtable discussion explores how fostering intrinsic motivation supports character development in an Elementary National School of Character. Centered on the themes of care, autonomy, competence, and interest, the session will invite participants to engage in dialogue about creating supportive, empowering, and engaging learning environments. Attendees will share and reflect on strategies that help students feel valued, take ownership of their learning, build resilience, and develop a lasting love of learning—key components of both motivation and character growth

Character Education in K-12 Athletics: Outcomes and Next Steps

Explore the Coaches for Character curriculum and its impact on K-12 athletics and school culture through insights gained from the first cohort. Next steps, curriculum changes, and preliminary data from Cohort 2 will also be discussed. Coaches for Character is an

in-service for middle school and high school coaches developed by high school athletic staff in collaboration with Samford University, specifically aimed at developing tools necessary to weave character development into the athletic arena.

Developing Character through Trust in Developing Collective Teacher and Student Efficacy

This session will explore the importance of self-assessment, goal setting, and progress monitoring in improving both student learning and school performance. By applying these strategies to both individual students and the school as a whole, participants will learn how to foster a culture of trust and character. The session will emphasize how a personal and collective sense of progress, driven by the belief that effort leads to improvement, can strengthen both academic outcomes and school community development.

Books That Build Character: Teaching Comprehension Skills Using Head, Heard, and Hands

This session highlights a collaborative approach to integrating character education into educator preparation programs and K-12 classrooms. By using high-quality children's literature and questioning strategies, preservice teachers scaffold their ability to teach character traits to future generations. Participants will learn about the process of selecting literature, creating character-focused questions, and developing a resource library for character education lessons, with insights from year two findings and extensions of the practice.

WISE Interventions: A Framework for Integrating Character Development into Existing Course Design

This workshop introduces the WISE Interventions framework, a non-prescriptive approach to integrating character traits into existing course designs without requiring course redesign. Focusing on the affective learning domain, the framework helps students connect their personal integrity to their academic performance, encouraging them to align their values with their work. Participants will have the opportunity to apply the framework in their own contexts and engage in ideasharing with colleagues to explore practical ways of incorporating these interventions into their teaching.

Making Waves

This engaging session brings together PK-12 and higher education educators to share innovative strategies and practical tools for character education. Participants will explore the Caught, Taught, and Sought model, access robust resources—including a 200+ page activity book—and learn about a free, asynchronous professional learning series. Whether you're a newcomer or a seasoned practitioner, this collaborative forum offers fresh insights to support and strengthen character development in educational settings.

One University's Approach: Embedding Virtue Prompts in Support of Framework Integration

Dr. Lori Doyle of Concordia University Irvine will present a collaborative initiative to integrate virtue prompts—focused on honesty, compassion, humility, and courage—across university programs as part of a servant leadership character framework. This two-year project engaged faculty at strategic points, fostering buy-in and collegiality, while embedding virtues into both undergraduate and graduate curricula. The session will highlight practical prompt examples, share insights from the process, and discuss a validated survey instrument developed to assess project outcomes.

Aquamarine #2

Exploring Ethical Dilemmas as Pedagogical Tools in Educational Leadership

This explores the use of ethical dilemmas as a powerful tool to enhance character teaching and ethical decision-making in graduate-level educational leadership training. Through a case study involving current and aspiring school leaders, participants analyzed complex school-based scenarios using the Character-Centered Leadership and Ethical Dilemma frameworks to navigate moral complexities. Findings highlight how this approach deepens ethical awareness, reveals differences based on gender and character education exposure, and supports the development of responsible, principled leadership in schools.

Empowering School Communities to Make Ethical & Equitable Decisions

This proposed project aims to enhance the ethical and equitable decision-making skills of K-12 educators through monthly professional development sessions focused on collaborative problem-solving. Educators will build their capacity for critical analysis and decision-making using an ethical dilemma reflection framework, which they will

then apply in their classrooms to model and teach these skills to students. In collaboration with higher education and K-12 educators, developmentally appropriate decision-making frameworks and curricular experiences will be designed to help students practice and internalize these skills, ultimately fostering both character and competence in educators and students alike.

Coral Reef

Cultivating Agents of Change

This presentation showcases how i3 Academy, a charter school in Birmingham, Alabama, aims to fulfill our mission to cultivate agents of change. We prioritize character development and restorative practices to empower students to repair harm and flourish in their lives and communities. Through advisory in morning circles, core values in our house system, restorative discipline, as well as self-management and accountability through our SOAR Matrix and cards, we will use this presentation to display how we embed character throughout our school and prepare scholars through a whole-child approach.

The Role of Robotics in Building Characte

This session will explore how robotics can be a powerful tool for character development by fostering teamwork, critical thinking, and resilience. Through problem-solving and collaboration in building and programming robots, participants develop communication skills, perseverance, and a growth mindset. Robotics teaches individuals the value of persistence, creativity, and shared responsibility, helping them grow both technically and personally.

Leading with Heart: Virtuous Leadership Lessons from Ted Lasso

This session explores how virtues, as outlined by the Jubilee Center's Virtuous Education Framework, combined with the humor and wisdom of Ted Lasso, can transform educational leadership in the face of rapid change. Participants will reflect on the challenges instructional leaders face, such as equity gaps and evolving expectations, and explore how virtues like courage, humility, compassion, integrity, and gratitude can foster thriving school communities. Through engaging activities and real-world scenarios, attendees will develop actionable strategies to address challenges, build community care, and create ethical, inclusive school cultures, leaving with a Virtuous Leadership Toolkit to guide their leadership practices.

Aquamarine #1

Tools for Strengthening Your Heart to Lead Well

Leadership is not for the faint of heart. This session focuses on ways to get stronger in Who We Are, so that What We Do can have a greater impact on our work in schools. The dispositions of educational leadership, drawn from PSEL Standard 2, have been translated into six commitments for becoming a Commitment-Based Leader. This session will explore insights, tools, and practices to build commitment in leader dispositions that foster strong relationships, professional ethics, educational equity, effective communication, and character to benefit the whole child in schools. Course activities from Samford University's Master's in Educational Leadership serve as the backdrop for ongoing research in this area.

Encouraging the heart: Character-guided mentorship in higher education

This session explores how effective mentoring in education can model and instill values such as integrity, respect, responsibility, and humility, which are key components of character education. Presenters will discuss a five-stage mentoring process—modeling, inspiring a shared vision, challenging the process, enabling others to act, and encouraging the heart—and its role in cultivating future educational leaders. By combining mentoring with real-life experiences, this approach helps educators internalize ethical values, build leadership capacity, and develop decision-making skills essential for impactful leadership.

The World as our Classroom: Seeking Character Education in International Contexts

This session explores how international learning and mission experiences provide unique opportunities for educators to integrate character education by fostering values such as empathy, respect, and cultural understanding. Participants will learn how students, through cohesive group dynamics and real-life experiences, internalize virtues, develop relationships, and model desired behaviors in diverse settings. The session

highlights practical strategies for facilitating character development through self-reflection, journaling, and cross-cultural interactions, emphasizing the role of educators in guiding students to grow through service and connection with others.

Aquamarine #2

Service Learning as a Gateway to Character Education

This presentation explores how service learning in Samford University's Teacher Education program fosters character development in pre-service candidates through ten hours of community-based service. Drawing from two years of reflective feedback, the session examines how candidates engage with the six pillars of character—trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring, and citizenship—alongside the eleven principles of effective character education. Attendees will gain insight into how structured reflection helps candidates define character, recognize their influence on others, and understand the deeper impact of service on both personal growth and professional practice.

That Could Be ME!: Biography as a Lesson in Character

This session will showcase a project that integrates character education across disciplines with a STEM and workforce development focus, inspiring high school students to write and illustrate stories about Alabama STEM professionals who overcame challenges to succeed. Participants will explore the "That Could Be ME!" books created by 34 student writers and illustrators, designed to inspire children to envision themselves in careers they may never have considered. Attendees will hear from the authors and illustrators, as well as the professionals featured in the books, and learn how to promote character development through the arts and literacy in their own educational settings.

Coral Reef

Virtues in Action: Embedding Character Education in Teacher Preparation

This interactive session highlights how the University of West Alabama integrates virtues education into its undergraduate teacher preparation programs, using the "Caught, Taught, and Sought" framework from the Jubilee Center. Participants will engage in activities based on preservice candidates' experiences, exploring how virtues like responsibility, compassion, and professionalism are developed through observation, instruction, and reflection. Attendees will leave with practical tools to embed virtues education in their own programs, enhancing ethical decision-making, collaborative teaching, and student-centered learning.

Rise by Rooting Down: Character Education Transformation Technology

This session focuses on transformational learning, using nature as a model for change, and emphasizes the importance of mentorship and coaching in character development. Participants will explore a blueprint for belonging, examining the intersections of nature, connection, behavior, SEL power skills, and ethics. Attendees will gain practical strategies for fostering a character education mindset and creating transformational learning experiences that promote growth, community, and belonging.

Cultivating Flourishing through Character and Life Skills Development: A Transformative Approach in a Teachers College

This interactive session will explore the transformative potential of Communities of Practice (CoPs) in embedding character education and life skills development within teacher preparation and educational leadership. Using Arizona State University's (ASU) Principled Innovation (PI) framework, the session integrates virtues, resilience, and ethical decision-making to foster human flourishing in education. Participants will engage in hands-on activities, such as structured reflection and scenario-based problem-solving, to learn how to model and integrate character education within their own institutions. The session will also present findings from a multi-year study showing the impact of CoPs on faculty development and student success. Attendees will leave with a replicable framework for creating CoPs to advance character education and build a culture of reflective practice in their schools and institutions.
